

Liturgist: Gracious Father, unite us in love with you at your table,


where the grace and life of Christ reconciles and restores us



Prayer for those searching

If what you claim is true, please guide me, teach me, and open me to the reality of who you are. Give me an understanding of you that is coherent and convincing and that leads to the life you promise. Amen.

We meditate on Jesus' suffering

And they went to a place called Gethsemane. And he said to his disciples, "Sit here while I pray." And he took with him Peter and James and John, and began to be greatly distressed and troubled. And he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death. Remain here and watch."
